Recap: Global Research Initiative 2009

Global Research Initiative (GRI) is a program that allows students to earn college credit for completing an applied research project for an international business.

In the academic year 2008-2009 ITC sponsored a GRI between Benedictine College in Atchison, Kansas and Western Forms, Inc. in Kansas City, Missouri. Five students were selected after participating in TradeWins, a team-based international business simulation run by the ITC Board members, Norm Burkart and Keith Hustings. The team from Benedictine included two seniors, John Bergida and Erin Klein. Also on the team were three juniors, Edna Hernandez, Matt Gregor and Megan Klump.

The 2008-2009 GRI project required the advisory support of Benedictine College faculty, ITC volunteers, significant contributions by Western Forms executives, and effective teamwork by the student team. GRI provides an organization

with valuable information, while students prove their mettle in a real-world business development project.

This GRI project was completed in two phases. In the first phase the GRI team analyzed industry specific economic data for all countries of the globe. The purpose of Phase I was to quantify market opportunities and select target markets tailored for the client company, Western Forms. In Phase II the GRI team developed a market penetration strategy into the selected markets. This phase also included conducting a survey to gather industry specific data and qualify potential prospects for Western Forms. The second phase will be completed in May 2009 before the end of the semester.

Economic Update Luncheon at the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City

Kansas City Fed official, Craig Hakkio, says that the nation's gross domestic product will hit bottom in the summer and begin a slow recovery with positive growth in the third quarter.

Speaking at an ITC sponsored luncheon, Hakkio pointed to three factors that will contribute to this improvement:

- The federal stimulus package is estimated to boost the GDP between 1.25 percentage points and 4 percentage points.
- Accommodating monetary policy, such as the Troubled Asset Relief Program (TARP) and the Troubled Asset-Based Securities Loan Facility (TALF), will unfreeze financial markets and trigger lending.

• Companies will begin to lessen the reduction of their inventories.

Hakkio pointed to inventories as a silver lining to a recent revised report that the nation's GDP fell 6.2 percent in the fourth quarter, compared with earlier estimates for a 3.8 percent drop. The adjustment suggests that inventories may be closer to their bottom than previously thought.



Hakkio said current financial market conditions are mixed. Commercial paper, mortgage and interbank markets are starting to see some improvement thanks to government interventions, he said. But about 80 percent of banks say that they are tightening standards, and that loans are declining. Economic conditions such as unemployment, housing, and the stock market also continue to worsen. Still, the U.S. financial markets remain "the most open, flexible and resilient that there are" and continue to attract international investors, Hakkio said. "When people want safety, U.S. Treasury securities are the safest in the global economy," he said.

Market Highlight: Kenya

A new feature of the ITC quarterly newsletter is a market highlight. The U.S. Commercial Service-Kansas City office is contributing to this series and will focus on a new country each quarter. This quarter we chose to highlight an interesting market with future potential, but currently going through some difficult times.

Kenya is the most developed economy in Eastern Africa. With a nominal 2008 gross domestic product (GDP) of USD 29.3 billion, it is also the economic, commercial, and logistical hub of the entire region. Kenya enjoys an extensive (if uneven) infrastructure, and a large portion of the population that is extraordinarily well educated, English-speaking, multi-lingual, and a strong entrepreneurial tradition. It is also a very young

country with almost 50% of Kenya's population under the age of 15. An estimated 46% of the population lives below the poverty line, and the country's GDP per capita is approximately USD 478.

Nairobi, Kenya is the undisputed transportation hub of Eastern and Central Africa and the largest city between Cairo and Johannesburg. The Port of Mombasa is the most important deep-water port in the region, supplying the shipping needs of more than a dozen countries despite stubborn deficiencies in equipment, inefficiency, and corruption. Kenya's financial and manufacturing industries, while relatively modest, are the most sophisticated in Eastern Africa. Its tourism industry, one of the most successful in the world, continued to expand until early 2008. The agricultural sector is the largest employer in Kenya. The country's major exports are tea, coffee, cut flowers, and vegetables.

Kenya's key economic challenge is to increase its real GDP growth rate. Sustained, significant economic growth is essential if Kenya is to address its high unemployment rate (officially about 10.5%, unofficially in excess of 40%) and widespread poverty. Achieving high growth, however, will depend on improved economic governance and greater economic reform. Kenya's strengths include its human resources, natural assets, and strategic location.

East Africa is likely to perform better than other parts of the continent this year because of its relative economic diversification, according to the African Development Bank (AfDB). Countries such as Kenya, which export finished goods to other East African countries and agricultural products to the rest of the world, could end up facing a less severe impact than other Sub-Sahara African countries that rely more heavily on exports in specified industries. Real GDP growth is expected to weaken further, from 2.2% in 2008 to 1.8% in 2009, owing to weak commodity prices and the global recession. Growth is expected to recover to 2.7% in 2010 as the global economy improves.

The government has taken steps to enhance Kenya's economic competitiveness. However, the country continues to face significant challenges associated with corruption. unemployment, tribal tensions, title to land, insecurity, and poverty. It remains a difficult market in which to do business. High inflation is also a concern with rates currently above 20%. Household finances are unstable, employment is suffering, and both remittances and agricultural exports are sharply down. Economic growth is likely to slow further in 2009 and 2010. Political stability remains elusive, with the two sides of the coalition government fast losing public support. While Kenya is not historically a stronghold of political stability, global economic problems substantially increase the risk of a return to political confrontation.

Kenya is not a low cost economy. The cost of skilled, educated labor is high by developing world standards. Skilled,

educated labor is relatively abundant in comparison with neighboring countries, but a very large portion of the young population is relatively unskilled and exists in an environment offering few opportunities. While Kenya's physical infrastructure is also superior in many cases to that of its neighbors, it remains basic and a key obstacle to economic development. Despite the price sensitivity of consumers and companies, there is little price competition in Kenya compared with many other fast-developing countries. This is both an opportunity and a challenge for a new investor or trader.

Leading Sectors for U.S Export and Investment are: telecommunications equipment, electrical power systems, material handling machinery, construction equipment, computers and peripherals, processed foods, medical equipment, aircraft and aircraft parts, agricultural chemicals, cosmetics and toiletries, and the agricultural sector.

Friday, March 20, 2009 Dixie Henderson, President, Shabobba ® International, LLC conducted an interactive on-site workshop and tour for 15 students at its gallery, 425 Washington, Kansas City, Missouri. The youth were participants at *The 2009 Kansas City 4-H Global Conference*, Kansas City, Missouri. Shabobba joined more than 50 businesses from the private and public sectors to support the endeavor. The annual conference provided opportunities for youth to explore careers, technology, environment and cultural diversity in a global society. The participants represented the states of Missouri, Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska, Arkansas, and Oklahoma.

The students also gained insight into the work of Shabobba's colleagues Eli Reed, Magnum Photos and Clinical Professor, Department of Photojournalism, University of Texas-Austin; and, the late Gordon Parks, a renowned photographer, photojournalist, writer, director, and filmmaker, and Aaron Rose, artist/photographer. Donald Greenhaus mentored Reed when he was a budding photographer. In 2007, Reed conducted the first Shabobba 4-H workshop on behalf of Donald Greenhaus. Aaron Rose was included in Shabobba's list of distinguished colleagues for 2009. In October 2008, Rose expressly invited Henderson to his SoHo studio in New York to peruse his work. Such an invitation is seldom, if ever, extended to anyone. In his book, Aaron Rose Photographs, Harry N. Abrams, Inc., Publishers, New York, 2001, Alfred Corn, Adjunct Professor of Writing, Columbia University said: "Aaron Rose created one of the most remarkable bodies of work of any photographer living today, and for most of his career he did this in isolation from both the art world, and the world of commercial photography, in a single-minded private quest for visual enlightenment." Corn is a poet, novelist, and critic who wrote the essay and interview for the book.



To explore the artists, and promote career awareness, the students tackled their assignments in teams with the assistance, and tutelage of international colleagues. Answers to International Trivia Corner:

- 1) False. There are actually many different varieties, including Gruyere, Emmenthaler, Appenzeller, Tilsiter, Raclette and so forth.
- 2) Pre-shipment inspection; a process in which an independent agency inspects merchandise to verify content, quality and value prior to its being shipped to the mostly developing nations which require the procedure.
- 3) Almost invariably John Q Machines, unless the freight forwarder takes a financial interest in the product itself. The shipment may qualify as a routed export transaction in which the buyer becomes the PPI and asks the freight forwarder to file the SED, however, that is the exception rather than the rule. In any scenario, John Q Machines is still held responsible for compliance with the Export Administration Regulations. The bottom line for area exporters: take control of these fairly common situations and ensure that the roles of the various players are completely understood by all.
